




Maya receives dedication award from Bishop

Year 5 visit to St. Patrick's


This term the school has welcomed visiting Year 5 classes from our neighbouring Feeder Primary Schools. The children have worked diligently with Miss Tandy, Miss Olsen and Miss Carney participating in a number of cross-curricular activities associated with Tchaikovsky's ballet Swan Lake.

Swan Lake tells the story of Odette, a princess turned into a swan by an evil sorcerer's curse. The class had a taste of Drama with Miss Olsen, which included playing cooperation games to warm up their bodies and mind. This was followed by freeze framing key scenes from Swan Lake, using levels, facial expressions and body language for a desired effect.

During a Music session with Miss Carney, the children attentively

listened to snippets of Tchaikovsky's music from Swan Lake. Using whiteboards they wrote down feeling words associated with the music and were able to explain how stories can be told through music.

Having enjoyed two practical activities, the children then put their imaginative and artistic






Stratford-upon-Avon

When asked about their experience the feedback that pupils gave was great! One pupil stated that the play was "brilliant


really interesting."

Blood Brothers

A couple of snowy days in January were really cheered up by this year's fantastic whole school production of 'Blood Brothers'.

The cast worked hard in rehearsals, including weekends, to bring the moving story of how twin brothers who are separated at birth, are given different opportunities in life and how ultimately this destroys them. The cast's dedication paid off with some well-choreographed and fast paced dance routines, strong comedic scenes and sustained Liverpool accents throughout.


Wearing the new kit when competing at a local, regional and national level is also meant to give players a greater sense of identity. Parents have had letters detailing which items are needed and how to purchase them.


St Patrick's girls' win after win
