

MISSION DAY 2024

Mission Day 2024! Walking into the dining hall on Monday 8th July, you could feel the buzz in the air. All the pupils were so excited about what the day would bring. What a success! 460 pupils left school first thing in the morning to go on six different concurrent trips – a hike at Rivington, Arcade Club, a visit to Manchester United, a faith trail, creative writing at RHS Bridgewater and kayaking...meanwhile, back at school, nearly 300 pupils engaged in lots of different activities – Mobile Planetarium, salsa dancing, orienteering, Science workshops, a cookery masterclass, Dragon Race, badgemaking and, last but by no means least, Play in a Day!

What on earth has this got to do with Mission, you may ask?! The purpose of Mission Day is to come together as a community for a day of joy and celebration. St. Patrick wanted to be like the apostles and spoke of his role as a missionary 'so that I...may imitate those whom the Lord long before now had said beforehand as going to herald his own gospel'. Pope Francis has said "Every Christian is called to be a missionary and witness to Christ. And the Church, the community of Christ's disciples, has no other mission than that of bringing the Gospel to the entire world by bearing witness to Christ. To evangelize is the very identity of the Church."















MISSION DAY 2024

What is our mission as a modern Catholic community? We see ourselves as wanting to 'go out and make a difference to God's world'. Our values help us to think about what kind of person a 'missionary disciple' is. Mission Day is an opportunity to reflect on what that means for our school but also, what that means for our pupils as individuals. All of our trips and activities were linked clearly to one of our values and what that means for our pupils; for example, when exploring the Mobile Planetarium, our pupils were transported into a world of space and science – this links to our value of truth and our call to understand the universe that God has created and how we belong here. Many of our pupils who chose Rivington hike had never done a long walk like this before and it put our value of resilience into practice through their demonstration of a positive attitude towards physical and mental challenges.

Our whole school community had a wonderful day (and God listened to our prayers about the weather!) and we were so proud of our pupils both offsite, representing school out in the community and onsite, who were so wonderful with our visitors. We can't wait to see what next year brings!

PUNCTUALITY REMINDERS



All pupils return to school on Tuesday 3rd September. All pupils are expected to be on site by 8.25am every day. Pupils are therefore expected to be sat down in Form period at 8.30am. Anyone arriving to school or Form after 8.30am is to be marked down as late which results in a 30 min lunch detention on that day. Anyone pupil arriving after 9.30am is marked as absent for the morning session and this results in a loss of attendance of 0.5 days. Pupil who arrive on bikes need to be on site by 8.20am at the latest to give themselves time to secure their bike in the bike storage area and then be ready to attend form period.


William received Man of the match in the Cup Final and Oliver scored a hat trick in the final league game!
