I always start my highlights of the term with Year 11 so this time I will start with Year 7! All Year 7 forms have been on a retreat to the Spiritan Centre this year to enhance their spiritual growth and bond as a form group. We had excellent feedback both from the children and from the centre about our pupils and how maturely they engaged with the day. Well done to Year 8, Year form tutors, Mr Elliot and Mrs Billington for such a team effort!

Last but not least, our lovely Year 11! What a lovely year group, full of funny, kind, sparky and selfless young people. They are working so hard ahead of their GCSEs and we are so proud of them. Between the PPEs (mock exams) in November and those in February they progressed so much; a testament to their dedication and trust in the staff who love teaching them so much. They will begin their GCSE exams two weeks after Easter-we are keeping them in our prayers and willing them on.

All year groups have now taken part in sessions on study skills. In these sessions, pupils were taught how to use a study schedule and how to revise using techniques such as flash cards and mind maps. As you may have noticed through the information sent home to you, we have changed the way we track your child's progress. As ever, there are too many amazing things that have happened this spring term to mention. However, I would like to highlight a few things we are particularly proud of:

Year 11 mock interviews: our children blew the interviewers away with their preparedness, their articulation and their warmth. Thank you to Miss Mainwaring for leading on this and to the volunteer interviewers from various industries (some of the parents/families of pupils) who gave up their time to give our children a valuable experience.

Michael Wheeler, MP for Eccles and Worsley, visit: Michael kindly joined us for an afternoon to tell us about his role as an MP and participate in a Question Time session. We felt so proud of the children involved and asking questions, many of whom would not typically put themselves forward to speak in this forum. So many children shone and showed they had such political and social awareness; their Catholic education shone through as they asked questions about protecting those less fortunate and ensuring politicians serve the most vulnerable in society best.

Speaking of politics, our very own head girl, Betws Redgrave, was successful in being elected Salford's next Youth Mayor. We are so proud of Betws and how she is prepared to serve others. We can rely on Betws as if she is a member of staff! She is a wonderful asset to our school and to Salford and she has set the bar very high for pupils at St Patrick's.

Ski trip to Italy: Mr Challoner led a group of 60 pupils to experience life on the slopes during February half term. 

CLASS CHARTS

Thank you to all our parents and carers for the positive support you have given the school and your participation in any surveys that have been requested this term.

As we further integrate and use Class Charts as our communication method to parents and carers, we wanted to inform you that when we return on Tuesday 22nd April that all staff will be using the "Detentions setting" function on Class Charts.



Detentions can have varying lengths including 15min/30mins/45mins or 1 hour. These are mainly during the school day but can also be after school. The different detention lengths allow for escalation/upscaling should a pupil not attend an original detention but also allow the staff to differentiate based on what type of behaviour has warranted the detention in the 1st place.

We would kindly request that you support the school if your child receives a detention as specified in the School's Home School Agreement. Staff receive no pleasure in issuing detentions or sanctions but it is crucial part of the School's Behaviour policy and needed if a pupil displays "misbehaviour". This also enables opportunities for restorative conversations between the teacher and pupil with the aim of improving behaviour.

It is the pupil's responsibility to ensure they attend any detention that may have been set. Non-attendance to a detention will be "Upscaled" by the teacher.

Feel free to communicate with the School should you have any feedback on the use of Class Charts regarding detentions.

Finally, please try to engage with your son/daughter at least twice a week about Homework deadlines, their Behaviour "Wheel" and if relevant, engage with them in discussion about detentions they may have received. Pupils should also be accessing Class Charts daily to ensure they keep on top of any homework deadlines.


YOUNG WRITERS ANTHOLOGY
